
2 Basic Definitions

- 1. TWAIN: Scanner communication protocol.
- 2. Pixel: PIcture ELement.
- 3. JPEG: Joint Photograph Experts Group.
- 4. GIF: Graphics Interchange Format.
- 5. Transparency: As in transparent GIFs.
- 6. Cropping: Removing extraneous background material.
- 7. WYSIWYG: What You See Is What You Get.
- 8. Image dimensions: width, height, depth.

These determine image size and, therefore, download time.

3 Basic Concepts

1. Image quality vs. image size:

2. The effect of scanning resolution.

No quality problem when re-sizing smaller. "Blockiness" when re-sizing larger. Demo with an image.

- 3. GIF vs. JPEG
 - (a) GIF palette size: 256 colors.
 - (b) JPEG palette size: unlimited.
 - (c) GIF is better for line art; JPEG for photos.
- 4. Paint Shop Pro demonstrations of:
 - (a) Changing color depth.
 - (b) Varying JPEG compression ratio.
 - (c) Changing image size.
 - (d) Image cropping.
 - (e) "Washing-out" an image so that it can be used as a background image.
